Years 5/6 cricket team just missed out in their Craven area semi-final, but played brilliantly and should be very proud of themselves.


In recognition of the quality of Parish School's PE provision and our commitment to the development of competition across the school and into the community we have been awarded the School Games Mark Gold Award.






SUNGLASSES

For safety reasons, and to prevent loss and damage, please could we ask that children don't bring sunglasses into school, unless they are needed for medical reasons.









EYE CHECKS

Routine sight checks are no longer carried out within schools by the local health trust. However, free NHS sight tests are available at opticians for all under 16s, and we would encourage you to ensure that your child's eyesight is tested regularly.

An eye test will be able to tell you:

- · How well your child can see
- How healthy their eyes are
- If there are any problems with your child's vision

Children often don't complain about their sight, but they may show signs of not being able to see clearly, such as:

- Sitting close to the TV
- · Holding objects very close to their face
- Blinking a lot
- Rubbing their eyes
